This week's story is all about a new BBC television programme called Style It Out. The programme is a fashion competition, where nine children get the chance to be clothes designers and put together different outfits.

What is fashion?

Would this competition be something you might enjoy?
Do like to pick and choose what you wear?
Do you have a favourite outfit? What does it look like?
How do you feel when you wear it?

The children taking part in the television show competition must make all their clothes using second-hand materials.

What does second-hand mean?

Second-hand means it is not new and someone else has already used or worn it. Using clothes and materials that are second-hand is good for our environment, because it means we don't throw as many clothes away and we don't need to make as many new ones.




Individual Liberty

Our religion or beliefs can influence the clothes we wear. We should never be treated unfairly because of our religion or beliefs.























UN Rights of a Child

Speaking and Listening

Birth to 5 Matters: Talks about past and present events in their own lives and in the lives of family members. Knows about similarities and differences between themselves and others, and among families.

Look at the Picture News poster: What can you see? What do you like or dislike about this picture? What do you think these people are doing?

Think about: What does second-hand mean?

Discuss that second-hand means it is not new and someone else has already used or worn it. Using clothes and materials that are second-hand is good for our environment, because it means we don't throw as many clothes away and we don't need to make as many new ones.

Question: Where can we get clothes from?

As we grow, we all need to get bigger clothes because the clothes we have become too small.

Look at the EY Resource, which shows where and how people can get clothes.

Think about: When you need more clothes, do you know where they come from? Have you had any second-hand clothes before? Maybe given to you from an older brother or sister, from a friend or bought from a charity shop?

Second-hand clothes shop role-play

Can you help set up and take on the roles of customers and workers in a second-hand clothes shop?

Birth to 5 Matters: Uses language to imagine and recreate roles and experiences in play situations.

Think about: What will we need to set up our second-hand clothes shop? What clothes do we need? Do we need to hang up the clothes, fold them on shelves or put them in baskets? How will people know how much each item is? Can you help a customer find what they are looking for? I wonder if the customer will try on the clothes! Do the clothes fit well? I wonder how much they will have to pay!

Resources: A range of clothes and clothing accessories such as scarfs, hats, gloves etc, hanging rail, coat hangers, till, money, price tags, pens, key vocabulary words

Writing

Can you design a new winter outfit for Peter Bear?

Birth to 5 Matters: Starts to develop their phonic knowledge by linking sounds to letters. Uses their developing phonic knowledge to write things such as labels and captions, later progressing to simple sentences.

Recap on this week's news story about the competition to design new outfits. Discuss that Peter Bear only wears a tshirt and is feeling a little chilly now that it's winter. Can you help? Think about: What do you think Peter Bear would look good wearing? What will help him to keep warm? I wonder what colours you will use! Does he need anything for his head, feet, neck? Can you label all the different things you have drawn on him?

Resources: Drawing and writing proforma (see EY Resource 1), pencils, sound mats

Water tray

Can you wash and hang up the baby clothes to dry?

Birth to 5 Matters: Manipulates objects using hands singly and together, such as squeezing water. Handles tools, objects, and malleable materials safely and with increasing control and intention.

Think about: Can you wash the baby clothes? How can you make sure you get all the dirt out? How will you get most of the water out of the clothes? I wonder if you tried squeezing the clothes! Can you hang them out to dry? How do you use the pegs to keep them on the line?

Resources: Water tray, scrubbing brushes, washing line, baby clothes, clothes pegs

Maths

Can you measure the shoes to find out the shoe size?

Birth to 5 Matters: Enjoys tackling problems involving prediction and discussion of comparisons of length paying attention to fairness and accuracy. Becomes familiar with measuring tools in everyday experiences and play.

Discuss that when we buy shoes, we measure our feet so we know what size shoes to buy. The shoes we have here have all lost the label that says what size they are, can you help to measure them? Model using cubes to measure the size of a shoe and model careful counting of the cubes to find out how many cubes long the shoe is.

Think about: Can you measure one of the shoes with the cubes? How many cubes long is the shoe? Can you measure another shoe? Do you think you will need more or fewer cubes for this shoe? Why do you think this? Can you put the shoes in order of size?

Resources: Real shoes of different sizes or images of shoes (see EY Resource 2), Unifix cubes to measure, rulers
