


Rule of Law

The province of Ontario is set to pass a new law that will make it compulsory for children aged 12 and under to wear lifejackets on boats. Rules and laws are there to help protect us and keep us safe.

Protected Characteristics

Speaking and Listening

Birth to 5 Matters: Talks about past and present events in their own life and in the lives of family members. Shows confidence in speaking to others about their own needs, wants, interests and opinions in a familiar group.

Look at the Picture News poster:

What can you see? What do you think these people are doing? Where do you think they are? This week's news story is about a new law that the government (the people in charge of a country) are making in Canada.

Think about: What is a law? Why do you think we have laws? What do you think might happen if someone breaks a law?

Have you ever been on a boat before? If so, did you wear a lifejacket? Do you know what kind of boat it was?

There are many different boat types. There are big boats, small boats, fast boats and slow boats.

Think about: Can you name any different types of boats that you know?

Think about: Which would you most like to go on? Why? Are there any you wouldn't like to try? Do you think everyone should wear lifejackets on all of these boats? Why?

Water Small World Role-play

Can you make up stories with people going out on boats?

Birth to 5 Matters: Plays cooperatively as part of a group to create, develop and act out an imaginary idea or narrative.

Think about: Who is going out on the boats today? What kind of boats are they going on? I hope they are wearing lifejackets! I wonder what will happen when they get out on the boat! I hope nothing goes wrong!

Resources: Water tray, boats (different kinds if possible) small world people

Drawing and Writing

Can you draw and write which boat you think Peter Bear should go on?

Birth to 5 Matters: Gives meaning to the marks they make as they draw and write. Begins to make letter-type shapes to represent the initial sound of their name and other familiar words. Starts to develop their phonic knowledge by linking sounds to letters.

Peter Bear has never been on a boat before and is so excited to try one, but he doesn't know what kind of boat to try first. Can you help him? Think about: What kind of boat do you think Peter Bear would enjoy going on? Can you draw the boat for him so he knows what it looks like? Why do you think he will enjoy this kind of boat? Can you write what this type of boat is called? Can you read back your writing? What else do you think he needs to know before he gets on this boat? Is there anything he needs?

Resources: Drawing and writing proforma (see EY Resource 1), pencils, sound mats

Funky Fingers / Maths

Can you help rescue bears in the water?

Birth to 5 Matters: Handles tools and objects safely and with increasing control and intention. Counts up to five items, recognising that the last number said represents the total counted so far.

Oh no, the bears have fallen out of the boat! Can you rescue them by using the tweezers to pick up the bears and put them back into the boat?

Think about: How do you use tweezers? Can you use tweezers to pick up a bear? I wonder if you can keep hold of the bear until it is safely back in the boat! How many bears have you rescued so far? How many do you have left to rescue?

Resources: Compare bears, blue material, boat or container made into a boat to collect the bears, tweezers

Maths

Can you give the correct sized lifejacket to Peter Bear and his family?

Birth to 5 Matters: In meaningful contexts, finds the longer or shorter of two items. Enjoys tackling problems involving prediction and discussion of comparisons of length.

Discuss that when people wear a lifejacket, it is very important that it fits properly. Peter Bear and his family are going to go out on a boat, but they need to make sure they put on the lifejacket that fits them. Can you help?

Think about: Why do think it's important the lifejacket fits properly? What could happen if the lifejacket was too big or too small? Can you put the bears in order of size? Which bear is the biggest? Which is the next biggest? Which bear is the smallest? Pick up a lifejacket. Which bear do you think it will fit? Can you try it? Does it look too big, too small or just right? How can you tell? Can you make sure every bear has a lifejacket that fits properly?

Resources: Bear and lifejacket images (see EY Resource 2), scissors and laminating pouches. Most children will need the bears and lifejackets ready cut out and laminated. Some children may enjoy having a go at cutting them out themselves.
