The Eurovision Song Contest is a singing competition. Lots of different countries enter the competition, with 26 different countries singing live in the final. This year's competition will be held in Liverpool, England. Each country will take it in turns to perform their song live and at the end, judges from each country will give scores for who they think deserves 1st place, 2nd place, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th. For each place, a number of points is given, so for 1st place a country will win 12 points and for 10th place, a country will receive just 1 point. After all countries have given their scores and the points have been added up, the winning country is announced.



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


Democracy

Whatever our nationality, we should be able to enjoy watching the Eurovision Song Contest, if we choose to.










Speaking and Listening

Birth to 5 Matters: Shows confidence in speaking to others about their own needs, wants, interests and opinions in a familiar group.

Look at the Picture News poster: What can you see? Who do you think this person is and what do you think they are doing?

Question: How can music help us?

People like to listen to music for lots of different reasons.

Think about: Do you think music is helping these children? How? When do you like to listen to music? How do you think music helps you?

Writing

Can you write out rules for your singing/dancing or talent competition?

Birth to 5 Matters: Starts to develop their phonic knowledge by linking sounds to letters. Uses their developing phonic knowledge to write things such as labels and captions, later progressing to simple sentences.

There are lots of rules in the Eurovision Song Contest competition e.g., no more than 6 people are allowed to be on stage for each performance; people must be at least 16 years old to be on stage; the song must not be any longer than 3 minutes.

Think about: Do you think rules are important in competitions like this? Why? Let's plan our own singing or dancing competition. Complete a shared write,

using EY Resource 1, where the children can think about the rules they would like to have in their own singing or dancing competition.

Think about: Shall we have a singing/dancing or a talent show competition? What rules do you think we should have? How many judges will there be? How old do all the people (the competitors) need to be to take part? How long will they have to perform their song/dance/act for? How many people are allowed to be on the stage at once?

Resources: competition rules proforma (see EY Resource 1), pencils, sound mats

Cutting and Sticking

Can you make a medal or trophy for the winning act of your singing/dancing or talent competition?

Birth to 5 Matters: Uses available resources to create props or creates imaginary ones to support play.

Think about: What will the winning act receive from our singing/dancing/talent

competition? How can you make one? What will you need? Does it need decorating? Does the act that comes second win anything?

Resources: junk modelling materials, colour papers, scissors, glue, sequins

Outdoor Role-play

Can you hold your own singing/dancing or talent competition?

Birth to 5 Matters: Uses language to imagine and recreate roles and experiences in play situations.

Children can perform different acts themselves or decide to use puppets/teddies to do the performing.

Think about: Can you work together to organise a singing/dancing/talent competition? What do you need? Can you build a stage? Where will the audience be? What will the audience sit on? Who is competing? Who are the judges? What are

the rules? How long do they have to perform for? How will you measure the time? I wonder if the judges give a score straight after the performance or at the end of all the acts! I wonder what the highest score possible will be! I wonder if the judges will write down each act's score!

Resources: outdoor area, large wooden blocks/crates, judges table, chairs or benches, musical instruments, dressing up clothes, clipboards and paper, egg timers, teddies or puppets to be performers

Maths

Can you be a judge and give out scores to all the acts?

Birth to 5 Matters: Begin to recognise numerals 0 to 10. Begins to explore and work out mathematical problems.

This activity can be differentiated to suit the needs of each child.

Activity idea 1 (use one set of score cards).

Think about: Can you give this act a score out of 10? Can you write down the name of the act and the score you gave them on the score sheet? Is your score higher or lower than the last score you gave? Who scored the highest? How do you know? Who is the winner? Who came second?

Activity idea 2 (use two sets of score cards and two judges).

Think about: Can you each give the act a score out of 10? Can you add both the scores to the recording sheet and work out the act's final score? How do you work out the final score? Who scored the highest? How many more points did teddy get than doll? How did you work that out?

Resources: score cards and recording score sheets (see EY Resource 2), outdoor role-play set (see Outdoor Role-play resources)
