


















Protected Characteristics



Speaking and Listening

Look at the Picture News poster: What can you see? What do you like or dislike about this picture? What do you think this week's news story could be all about? Writing

Can you write a list of jobs that a farmer needs to do?

Birth to 5 Matters: Starts to develop their phonic knowledge by linking sounds to letters. Uses their developing phonic knowledge to write things such as labels and captions, later progressing to simple sentences.

Farmers are very busy and have lots of jobs to do. One thing farmers can do to help them remember all their jobs is to write a list. Can you help? Discuss all the different jobs that farmers need to do

such as feed the animals, muck out, put fresh straw in the animals' beds, plant the seeds, cut the crops etc.

Think about: What job will you write on your list first? Is this the most important job? What other jobs does a farmer need to do? Do they need to do anything for the animals, the crops in the fields?

Resources: Drawing and writing proforma (see EY Resource 1), pencils, sound mats

Painting

Can you help to paint a large farm picture?

Birth to 5 Matters: Creates representations of both imaginary and real-life ideas, events, people and objects.

Think about all the animals and different objects that could live on a farm. Let's paint a picture of a farm together!
Discuss that each child could paint either a farm building, a farm animal, a farmer, a tractor etc, and then we can cut out our paintings to make a large joint painting.

Think about: What part of the farm would you like to paint? What colours do you need? Could we find a picture of one to help you? What part will you paint first? Do you think you need a thick brush or a thinner one? I wonder what other detail you will add to your picture!

Resources: Simple images of farm animals, farm machinery, sheds, farmers, children's paint, paint brushes, paper, painting aprons

Small World Role-play

Can you make up stories with the farmers and farm animals?

Birth to 5 Matters: Introduces a storyline or narrative into their play.

Think about: I wonder what is happening on the farm today! What do the farmers need to do? I hope nothing goes wrong on the farm today! I wonder if any of the animals have ever got out of their field before! Are all the animals OK? I hope the farmer doesn't need to call a vet out today! I wonder what tractor jobs will need doing today!

Resources: Tuff tray, green and brown materials, small world farm animals, people, fences, farm buildings, farm machinery, stories and non-fiction books linked to farms, key vocabulary cards

Maths

Can you practise your maths skills whilst you collect eggs from the hens?

Birth to 5 Matters: Matches the numeral with a group of items to show how many there are (up to 10). Begins to explore and work out mathematical problems, using signs and strategies of their own choice, including (when appropriate) standard numerals, tallies and "+" or "-".

Remind the children that one of the jobs of a farmer is to collect and then sell their eggs.

Think about: Can you count how many eggs this hen has laid? Can you find the number to match the amount you counted? What about this hen? I wonder how many eggs that makes altogether! How could we work this out? How could you write this as a number sentence?

Resources: Egg boxes, printable hens and eggs (see EY Resource 2) or plastic eggs, numbers, individual whiteboards, whiteboard pens, baskets, straw
