

Speaking and Listening

Birth to 5 Matters: Shows confidence in speaking to others about their own needs, wants, interests and opinions in a familiar group.

Look at the Picture News poster: What can you see? What do you like or dislike about this picture? What do you think these people are doing? What do you think is happening in this week's story?

Maths

Can you explore the shapes of pentagons and hexagons?

Birth to 5 Matters: Enjoys partitioning and combining shapes to make new shapes with 2D shapes. Enjoys composing and decomposing shapes, learning which shapes combine to make other shapes.

Look at a football and discuss what shapes you can see. Discuss that footballs are usually made up of hexagons or pentagons. Discuss how we know a shape is a hexagon or a pentagon. Think about: Can you sort the 2D shapes and put the pentagons in one pile, the hexagons in another pile? How do you know all these shapes are pentagons/hexagons? Can you explore making patterns with them and seeing how the shapes fit together? Do the pentagons and hexagons fit together? I wonder if you can use any other shapes to make a hexagon or pentagon!

Resources: 2D shapes, baskets to help sort shapes, images of hexagon and pentagon patterns (see EY Resource 2)

Writing

Can you take on the role of a football manager and fill in the game sheet?

Birth to 5 Matters: Starts to develop their phonic knowledge by linking sounds to letters. Uses their developing phonic knowledge to write things such as labels and captions, later progressing to simple sentences.

Explain that a football manager has to pick the team and record the details of the game, such as the number of goals scored and who scored them. Using EY Resource 1, model pretending to be the football team manager and complete the game sheet, which includes writing down the player names for each team, the details of the game and the final score.

Encourage the children to be a football manager of their own team and fill in a game sheet. They can act out games using the small world football scene or with a game of football outdoors.

Think about: Who is the manager of this game? Who are your team's players? Who will you play against? Will you have a referee? What has happened so far that you need to write down? What was the final score?

Resources: Game sheet proforma (see EY Resource 1), pencils, clipboards, a football and goals or the small world football scene

Outdoor

Can you practise some football skills?

Birth to 5 Matters: Travels with confidence and skill around equipment. Shows increasing control over an object in pushing, patting, throwing, catching or kicking it.

Think about: What football skill would you like to practise first? Can you practise dribbling the ball? Can you use different parts of your foot e.g., the front/the side? Can you practise running as fast as you

can in order to get to the ball first? Can you practise kicking the ball as far as you can? Which skill do you find the easiest? Which do you find the most difficult? If you keep practising, do you think you will get even better?

Resources: Outdoor area, footballs, goals, coloured bibs, cones, whistle, stopwatch or egg timers

Small World Football Role-play

Can you make up stories with the football players?

Birth to 5 Matters: Uses language to imagine and recreate roles and experiences in play situations. Introduces a storyline or narrative into their play.

Think about: Who is playing? How many players are on each team? Which goal does this team need to score into? Is there a referee? Will you time your game? How? Resources: Tuff tray, fake grass, white chalk to draw the pitch, construction blocks to make the goals, small world people, small ball like a ping pong ball, whistle, stopwatch or egg timers
